





Celebrating Dr. Seuss Day at Robbins Elementary



All around the school classes at Robbins were celebrating in a plethora of ways. Take a look at how other classes celebrated:


- Kathy and Jessie's first grade class read *Horton Hears a Who*. Then they wrote a good deed they did and drew a picture. They decorated the door with these deeds, titling it "A person is a person no matter how tall. Share a good deed that made you feel tall!" This week the class will do a lesson with *The Cat in the Hat* and rhyming.
- Bryanna and Christine's second grade class read *Gertrude McFuzz* and then wrote letters to Dr. Seuss, wishing him a happy birthday and thanking him for something he has done.
- Susan and Danielle R.'s second grade class will read *Oh the Places You'll Go!*, followed by a lesson on common and proper nouns this week.
- Michelle D. and Kelly's second grade class read *Hooray for Diffendoofer Day!*
- Allison and Valerie's third grade class, as well as Danielle M. and Ashley's class had a scavenger hunt around the school, looking for pictures of Dr. Seuss books that were hung around.
- Danielle M. And Ashley's third grade class will also do a writing lesson using *The Cat in the Hat*.

Black History Month!

During the month of February Black History is celebrated. This celebration remembers those black men and women that have made an impact on history. Black history has been recognized annually since 1926. This recognition began as only a one week celebration, but has now come to be celebrated throughout the whole month of February in the United States. At Robbins Elementary, many classes have celebrated in many different and interesting ways. They have learned about a plethora of different important black figures in history.

In Mrs. Vasquez's second grade bilingual class they have talked about many different men and women, including Martin Luther King Jr., Rosa Parks, and Ruby Bridges throughout the month. Over the last two weeks Susan and Danielle R. have also done three read-alouds and activities to teach more about more important individuals. The first read-aloud was a book called *Duke Ellington* by Andrea Davis Pinkney about the famous jazz pianist, Duke Ellington. The class was then asked to recall important facts about him. The second read-aloud was *Henry's Freedom Box* by Ellen Levine. This is about Henry "Box" Brown, a man who mailed himself to freedom using the Underground Railroad. The class was then asked to create their own "freedom box", trying to write about the experience from Henry's point of view. The last read-aloud was the book *Teammates* by Peter Golenbock, about Jackie Robinson, the first black baseball player to join the Major League. The class then created baseball cards, where they drew themselves on one side and had to recall key details from the story on the other.


There is a school wide assembly on Friday, March 8, celebrating both Black History Month and Read Across America.






